Emerging Trends of Violent Extremism and the Future of Prevention of Violent Extremism in Libya



Conference

10th → 12th October

Background

The political and socio-economic structural challenges plaguing Libya since 2011 have established a favourable environment for the development of Violent Extremist (VE) groups, who present a persisting threat to the everyday security of the Libyan populace. VE groups will likely continue to pose a challenge to the country's stability while the underlying, multi-faceted factors and causes of violent extremism and recruitment into VE groups remain unaddressed.

Within this context, the Libyan Counter Terrorism Centre (LCTC) has invited UNDP Libya to support the expansion of the Prevention of Violent Extremism (PVE) component of Libya's Counterterrorism (CT) Strategy, which was finalised in November 2020, and to develop guidelines and plans for the prevention of violent extremism in Libya. To this end, UNDP is carrying out a pioneering PVE program focusing on the participatory development of seven municipal-level PVE strategies, the elaboration of tools and plans for peace education, peace messaging, and the strategic engagement of cross-border communities, and the development of a comprehensive national PVE strategy and action plan with the Government of Libya (GoL). These actions will help strengthen the capacities of governance structures and empower communities to effectively address the most sensitive drivers of VE in Libya.

Given the unique and varied push and pull factors throughout Libya, UNDP will also support municipalities to develop their own targeted, localized PVE strategies which are tailored to specific realities while being adaptable to changing contexts. This process will ultimately enable the Government of Libya to address major factors and root causes of VE more effectively, ultimately leading to greater stability and security in Libya.

Objectives

The LCTC have requested UNDP, as an integral part of the EU funded Stability, Unity, and Social Cohesion (SUSC) project, to hold a three days PVE conference that support the creation of a common and shared understanding of VE risks', trends in Libya, and its linkages to regional and global dynamics, of what works and does not work, to feed into the development of the Libyan PVE strategic framework and coordination mechanisms at the international, national, and local level.

The main objectives are:





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- To provide a safe and secure platform for lessons learned and best practices to be shared and exchanged among international, national, and local PVE policy makers, practitioners, and academics.
- To address major VE risks and their trends in Libya and its linkages to regional and global dynamics; to feed into the development of an evidence based PVE strategic framework.
- To establish a PVE community of practice in Libya.
- To launch national, international, and local PVE technical working groups.

Scope

The scope of the PVE conference includes (but is not limited to) understanding the following:

- Libya in Context: CT & VE drivers, indicators, trends, risks, identifying Key Issues
- PVE: The Landscape of Approaches & Frameworks
- Critical Challenges & Risks to PVE Programming
- Cultivating a Local & National Ownership to PVE
- Crucial Roles of Civil Society in National PVE Dialogues
- PVE national and local ownership and leadership: coordination mechanisms (international. National).
- PVE Communication & Media Issues
- Sample PVE in Practice: Peace Messaging or Peace Education Programs
- Sample PVE in Practice: Issues involving Livelihood
- Working Group Sessions (Risk/ threat identification, PVE vision and priority thematic areas, and coordination mechanisms).



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Conference Date, duration, and place

The conference will be a three (3) days event from

on 10th to 12th October 2022

in Tunis, Tunisia.

Participants

The conference will be attended by PVE policy makers, practitioners, and academics from Libya and the MENA region, in addition to international partners, as shown in annex (1).

Roles and responsibilities

The SUSC-PVE team is responsible for the management of the technical and logistical aspects of the conference, including: (i) the selection of a suitable location or venue; (ii) book, rent, prepare, and arrange the venue; (iii) coffee and lunch breaks, transportation of participants, and accommodation; (iv) drafting the agenda for the event; (v) the implementation of the event; (vi) maintain an attendance record; and (vii) drafting of the final evaluation and report.

Moreover, UNDP will oversee the arrangement of flights and the payment of DSA for international PVE experts as well as reservation of the hotel room. The LCTC, In partnership with the UNDP, will facilitate invitations to GoL participants, as well as participating in the conference by opening and closing the event, presenting, and facilitating several breakout sessions.

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Conference methodology

The conference framework will be within the following five principles:

PVE is "whole of community" responsibility:

The conference is based on the understanding that preventing violent extremism is the responsibility of all Libyans, not just the GoL institutions. Therefore, the conference is keen on the participation of Libyans from many sections of society, governmental, and non-governmental PVE actors.

Interactivity, collaboration, and participation:

The conference will involve participants actively, by encouraging questions and active participation.

No one size fits all:

VE is a multifaceted phenomenon, where there is no single cause or factor that explains these complex phenomena. Therefore, conference speeches, presentations, and discussions will attempt to test many assumptions/ hypotheses, either in addressing VE factors and causes or PVE interventions. The conference will be a good opportunity to test what works and what doesn't work in PVE.

Networking:

The event will provide a key opportunity for the national and local level authorities' representatives, civil society, and other major local stakeholders to present their work amongst each other, address challenges, opportunities for cooperation as an initial step towards bridging the gap and networking. This while taking advantage of participants' experience, knowledge, and personal resources..

Action-learning:

In addition to presenting relevant information regarding the PVE conference will use the 'learning-by-doing' approach to allow participants to acquire some of the necessary skills, competences, and tools. This includes discussing their experiences while also presenting challenges, achievements and lessons learned. It drew on problem-solving situations through teamwork or individual learning to advance individual skills and develop leadership attitudes.
